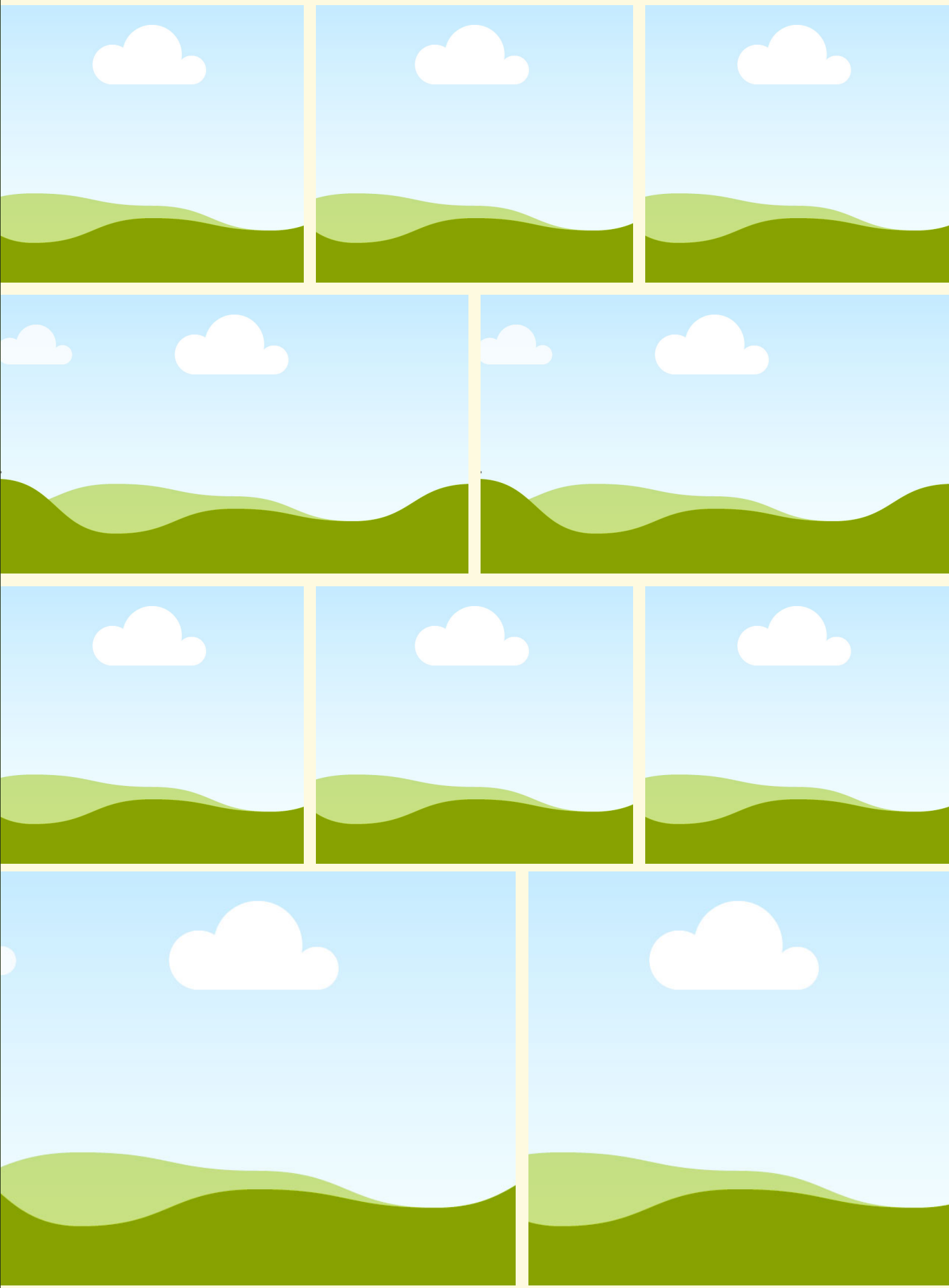

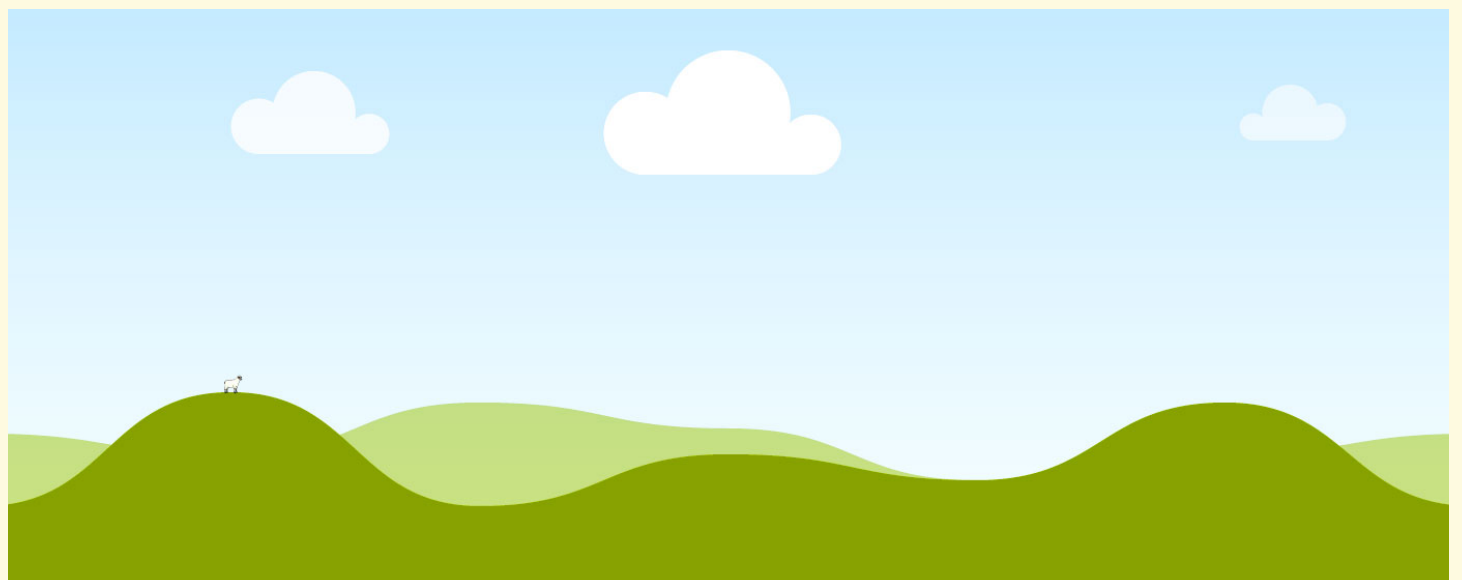
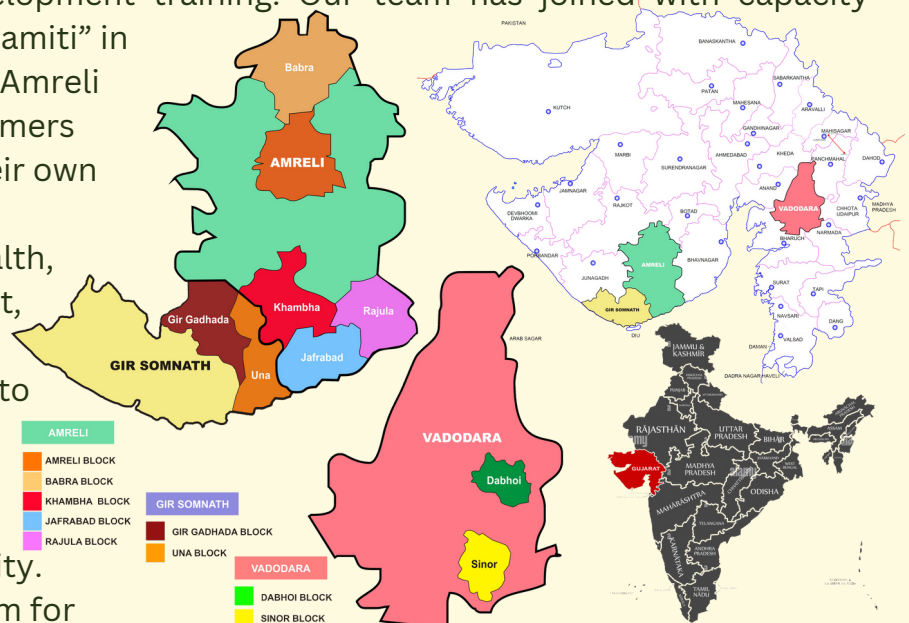
About us

This organization was established in 1993 by the collective efforts of Mr. Nayan Gandhi, Pushpa Patel, Suresh Gohil and Dhiraj Vagadia. At that time, it was decided to work according to the ideas and vision of the founders for the purpose of the improvement in health and education services of the Amreli district.

As per it, an organisation started its work of Primary education and Reproductive and Child Health program. We have discussed joining a livelihood program for women after seven years of establishment and starting vocational training for women. The organization also included activities like the construction of houses for Agariya living in peripheral areas of the sea, renovation of historical places and educational research. Now as per our huge experience, the organization has started activities of natural resource management, formation of SHGs for self-employment and skill development training. Our team has joined with capacity building activity of "Gram Sanjivani Samiti" in Khambha, Dhari and Amreli blocks of Amreli districts also we could encourage farmers of Jafrabad block to formation of their own companies.

We are working on the issues like Health, Education and Women empowerment, Self Help Groups, Agriculture and Environment. Especially our focus is to provide equal chances of business, education and health to youth of unorganized sector, women, children and economically deprived community.

Organisation arrange training program for community to encourage and develop independent business. We are also joined with activities like natural resources management and agriculture. Our main strength lies in our experienced team thus we can implement our program successfully from grassroots level.



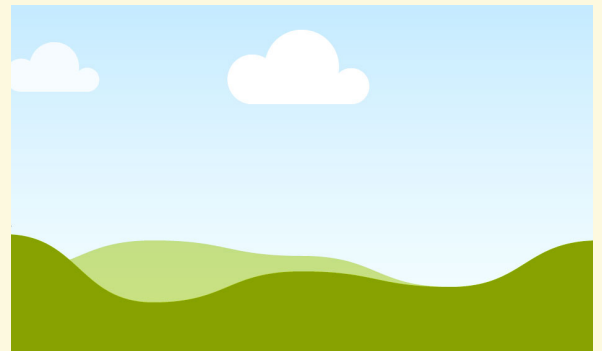
Programs

Awareness about general health

The organization undertakes collaborative efforts to create health awareness in the community in rural areas which includes education, engagement and active participation of community members. The organization knows that focusing on local strategies, as well as integrating existing community cultural practices, can significantly improve health outcomes and quality of life.

Health Check-up camp for children of Segva village

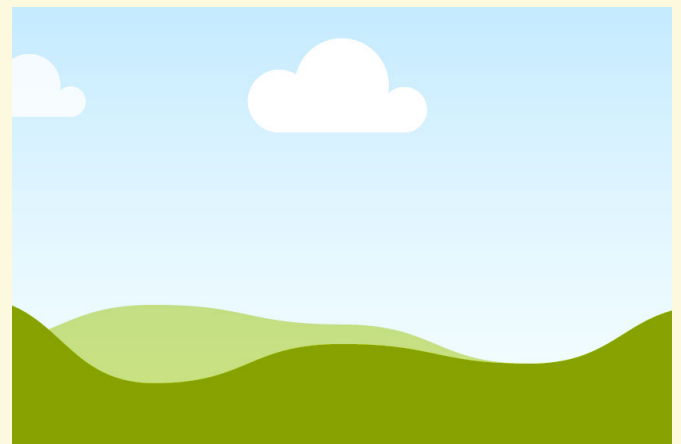
On March 5, 2025, a health camp was organized by the organization at the Primary School in Segva Village, Vadodara district. The camp provided eye check-ups, blood group testing, and general health examinations for school children. This initiative aimed to promote early health awareness and support the well-being of students through preventive care.



Education & Child Care

Gender Education

To stop violence and discrimination against women and girls, the organisation has been running this program for the last 5 years with boys and girls of age group 13 to 17 in 4 blocks of Amreli district. Volunteer team of organisation has been providing training to make understand adolescents' boys and girls about gender, to challenge to gender norms in society with knowledge, skill and leadership. The organisation organised two rounds of Foundation Program and Action for Equality Course both containing 15 modules each.



Objective of the project

- To raise awareness among boys about the importance of gender equality and the negative impact of gender norms on society.
- To empower boys with the knowledge, skills, and resources needed to challenge gender stereotypes and promote gender equality within their communities.
- To reduce harmful behaviours towards women and girls by encouraging respectful attitudes and behaviours among boys.
- To enable boys to work in groups and influence their peers, family members, and community members in order to increase awareness within society.
- Ultimately, to contribute significantly towards building a society free from gender-based violence and discrimination.
- To make efforts to prevent physical, emotional, and sexual violence against women.
- To encourage men to respect women and help find solutions to the challenges faced by women.

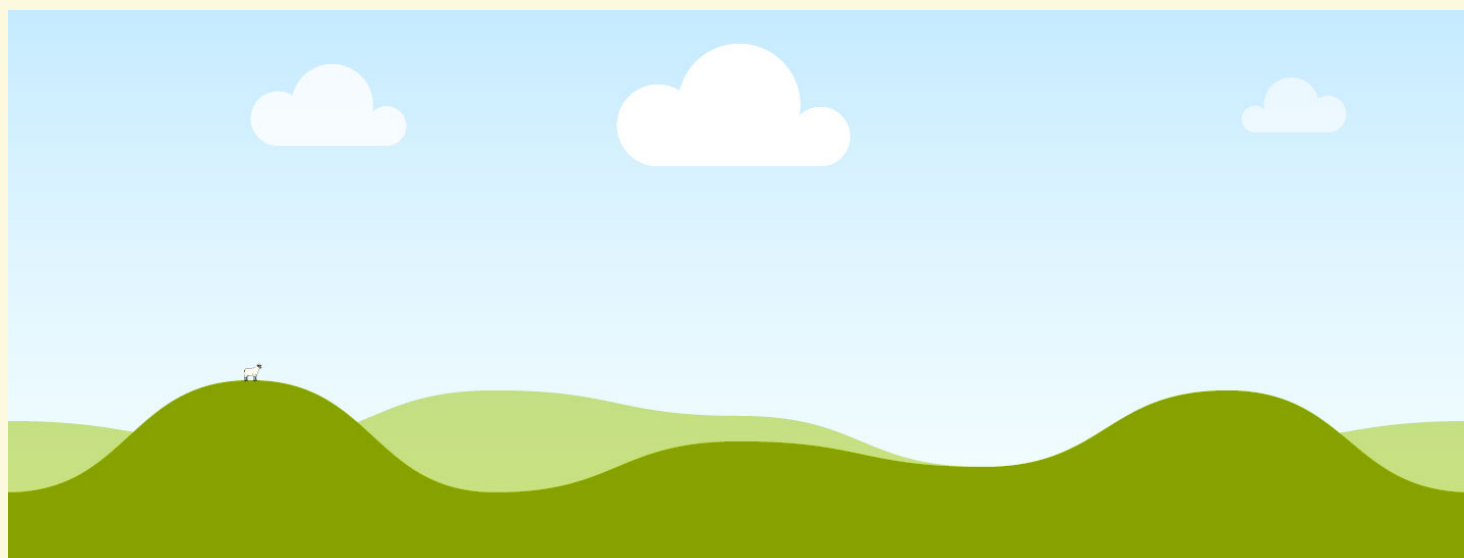

Many of these children have either dropped out or never had the chance to attend school due to the challenges of migration. Through this intervention, we aim to bridge the gap and give them a chance to thrive.

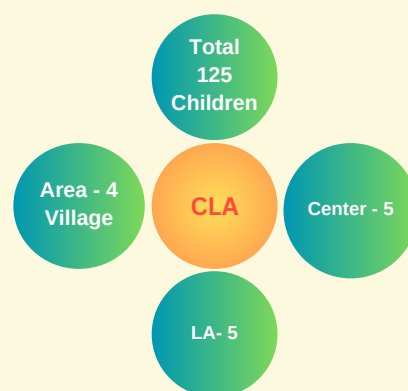
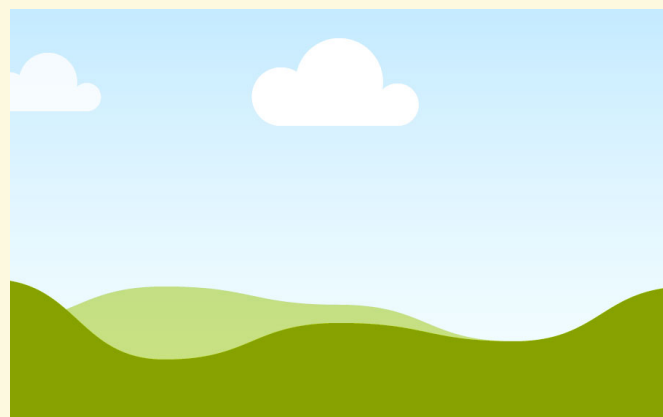


Centre for Learning Assistance

(Enables students to develop resilience and well-being by providing positive guidance and a fear-free environment)

During the period, the CORONA **Centre for Learning Assistance (CLA)** came into existence with the support of Hariraj. In CLA we put emphasis more on language and basic maths. We were trying to overcome the weakness of writing, reading and pronunciation and also to increase creativity, imagination power and originality.

The main objective of the CLA is that parents become sensitive to their children's education and children can learn with fun and interest in a free and child-friendly environment. We are also trying to involve parents in the learning process. This year we have started five canters, including two centres in Bhankodar village with the support of 5 volunteers/Learning Assistants/Mentor we reached 125 children.

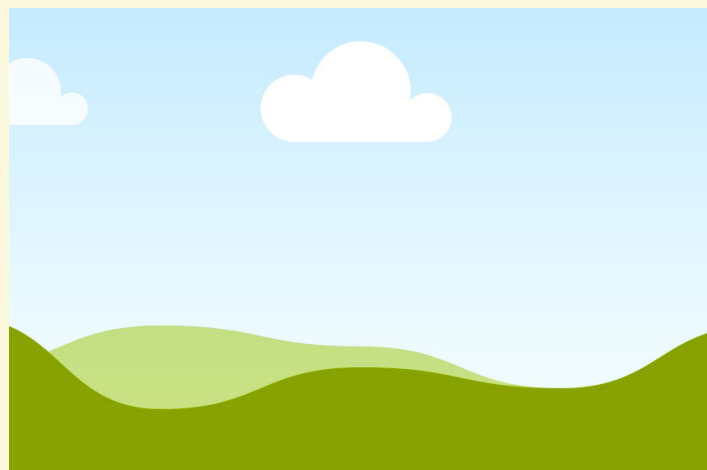

Students Exposure at Maidhar

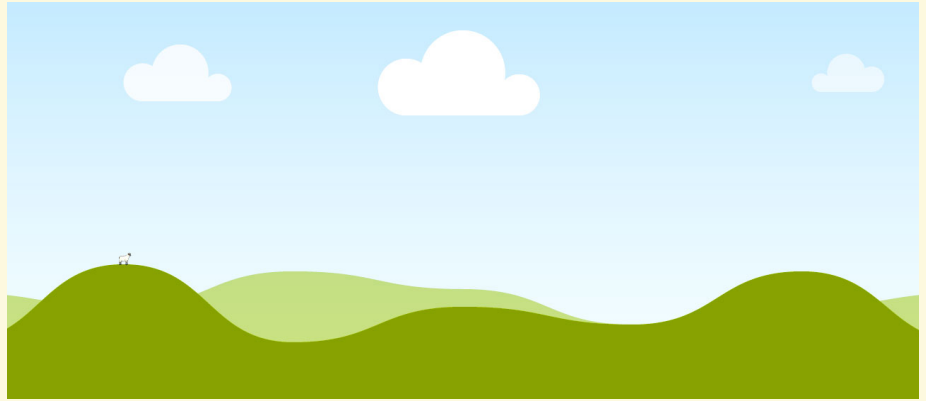
Our students from the CLA & GE program had an exposure visit to Lokbharti Vidyalaya – Science Innovation Center, Maidhar, where they explored innovative workshops and gained practical knowledge through live scientific demonstrations. They observed experiments such as an automatically moving vehicle, clap-activated bulb, plastic toy-making machine, and a weather-responsive clothesline system. Interactive games and activities helped improve concentration and understanding of science in a

fun way, including a paper bag-making workshop. The engaging environment provided valuable learning and skill-building experiences for all participants.



Farmers exposure at Aanand Agriculture University

As part of the program, an exposure visit for farmers was organized at Aanand Agricultural University (AAU) on 22nd August. During the visit, scientists from AAU provided valuable guidance on integrated cotton crop management and natural farming practices.



Farmers also visited demonstration plots showcasing sustainable agricultural techniques, including the preparation of homemade bio-inputs and vermicomposting at the Agronomy Farm. The exposure visit offered practical insights into eco-friendly farming methods aimed at reducing chemical use while enhancing productivity. These learnings empowered farmers to adopt innovative and sustainable practices in their own fields.

Format: Virtual Group Reading & Reflection

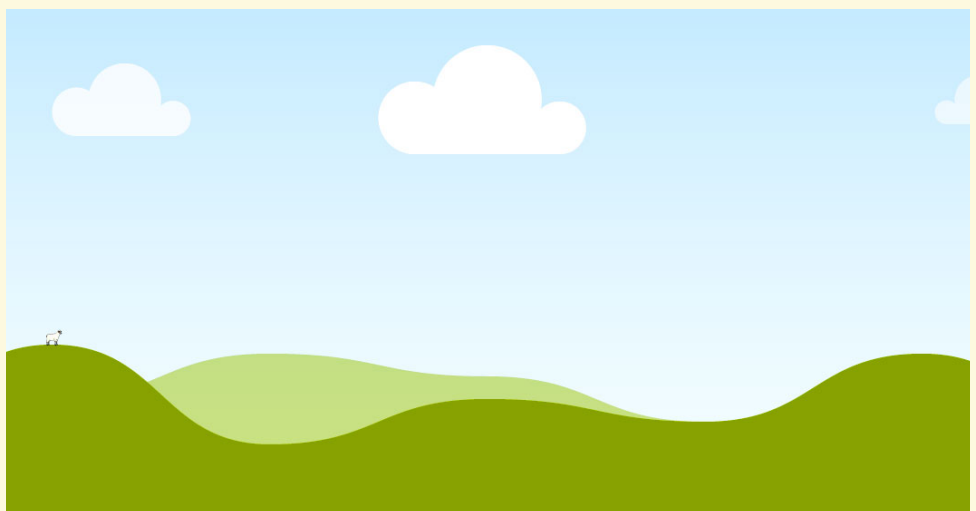
As part of our ongoing commitment to building internal capacity and nurturing leadership skills, we run a Weekly Online Reading Circle. Last three years this early- Friday session has become a consistent and enriching practice for our staff members.

Each week, team members come together virtually to read and discuss one of the most influential books on personal and professional effectiveness – The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People by Stephen R. Covey. The sessions are conducted in Gujarati, using the thoughtful translation by Sanjeev Shah, making the powerful concepts more accessible and relatable.

Objectives of the Reading Circle:

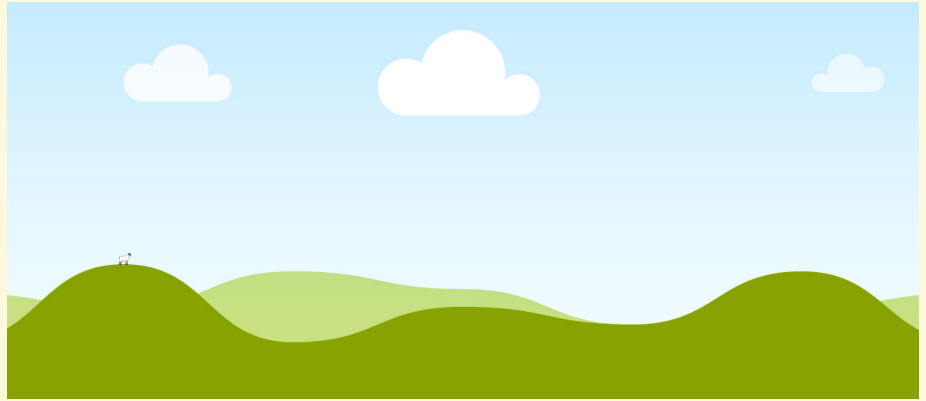
- To foster a growth mindset and self-awareness among team members
- To encourage reflection on values, habits, and leadership approaches
- To strengthen communication, collaboration, and personal accountability
- To provide a space for dialogue and mutual learning

Through active participation, staff members are not only learning the principles of proactivity, prioritization, effective communication, and synergy but also applying these habits in their work and daily life. The group discussions help deepen understanding, create a sense of community, and support individual development.



Biweekly Virtual Write-Up Sessions

we conducted **biweekly virtual write-up sessions** every Monday throughout the year. These sessions were designed to strengthen the **report writing and documentation skills** of our staff members across the organization.

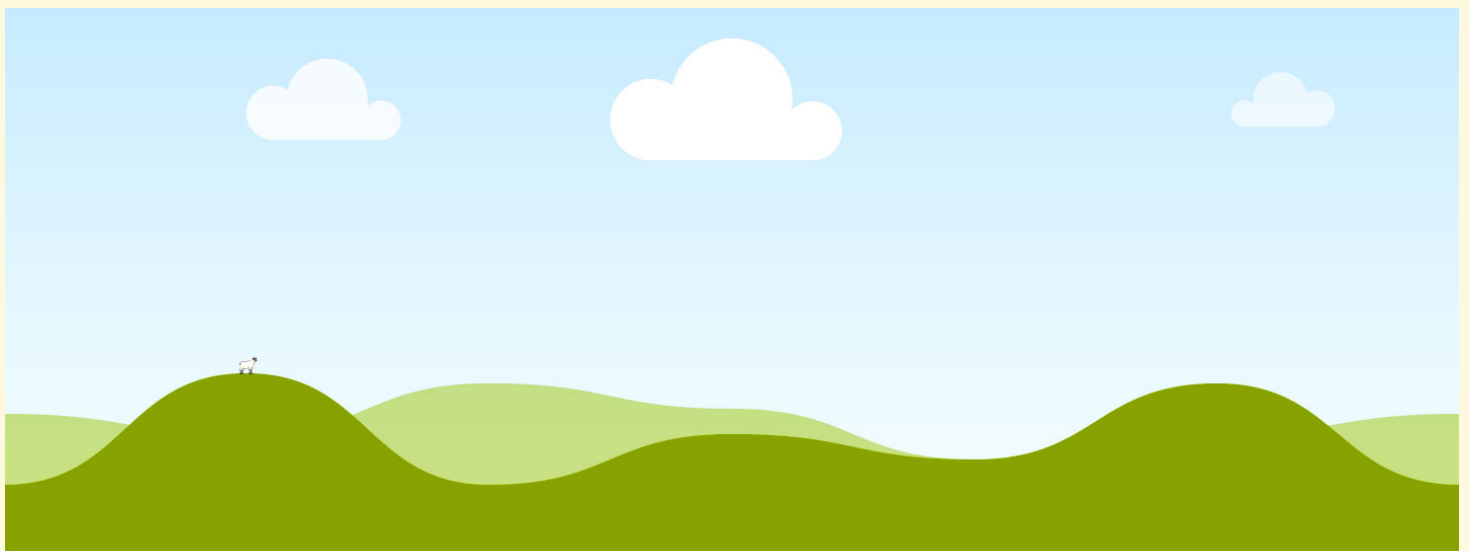


During each session, staff members presented a variety of written reports including success stories from the field, Meeting summaries and reflections and Activity or program reports. Following each presentation, peer feedback and guidance from the departmental head were provided. These reflections focused on Improving clarity and structure, Enhancing storytelling and impact communication and strengthening language and grammar usage. This practice helped create a culture of learning and continuous improvement. It also encouraged staff to express their experiences more effectively and increased confidence in writing.

Natural Resources Management

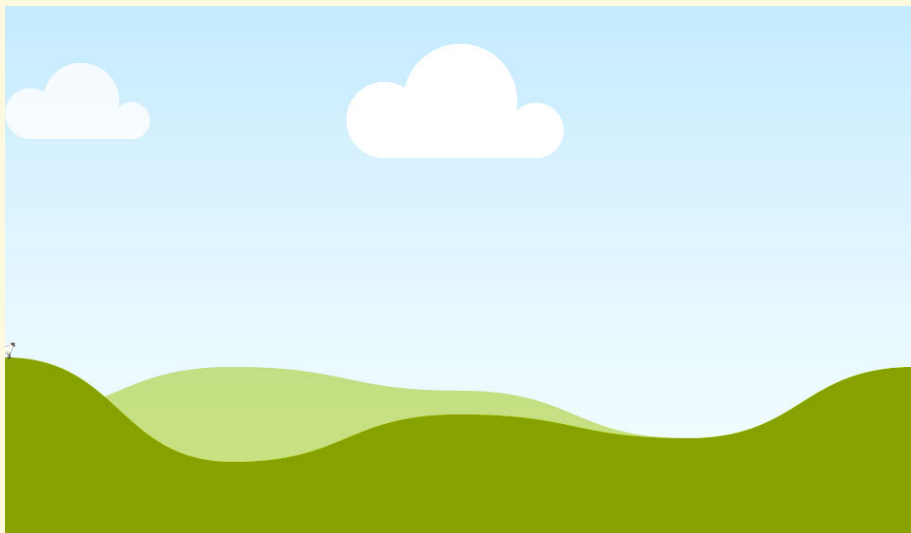
Agriculture and Biodiversity

As part of our commitment to sustainable agriculture, the organization has focused on promoting scientific farming practices among rural communities. Our trained field team has actively engaged with farmers through awareness campaigns and continuous dialogue to encourage practices that support ecological balance. These efforts emphasize the conservation of biodiversity, improvement of soil and water quality, protection of wetlands and wildlife, and the avoidance of hazardous inputs and farming methods. Special attention has been given to guiding farmers in Khambha, Babara, Dabhoi, Shinor, Karjan, and the Vadodara region toward adopting natural and organic farming techniques. Through these initiatives, we aim to strengthen environmental stewardship while enhancing the long-term resilience of farming systems.



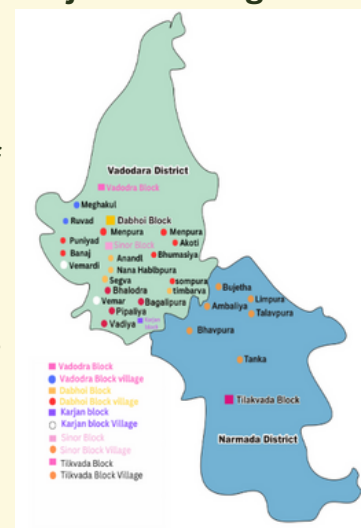
REEL (Responsible Environment & Enhance Livelihood) Cotton Farmer Training Program

Over the past four years, the organization has worked with 1,650 farmers across 26 villages in the Dabhoi, Shinor, Karjan, Tilakvada, and Vadodara blocks of Vadodara and Narmada districts, with the support of Cotton Connect. The primary objective of this initiative is to implement capacity-building interventions aimed at improving farm income and strengthening rural livelihoods.



Grounded in the principles of Reel Regenerative Agriculture—a holistic approach that nurtures soil vitality, conserves biodiversity, and enhances farmer resilience—the program emphasizes sustainable, environmentally sound farming practices. Through a combination of practical training, demonstration plots, bio-input production, and community awareness campaigns, the initiative equips farmers with the knowledge and tools needed to adopt organic and natural farming methods. These efforts not only promote ecological balance and conserve natural resources but also build long-term sustainability and social safeguards for farming communities.

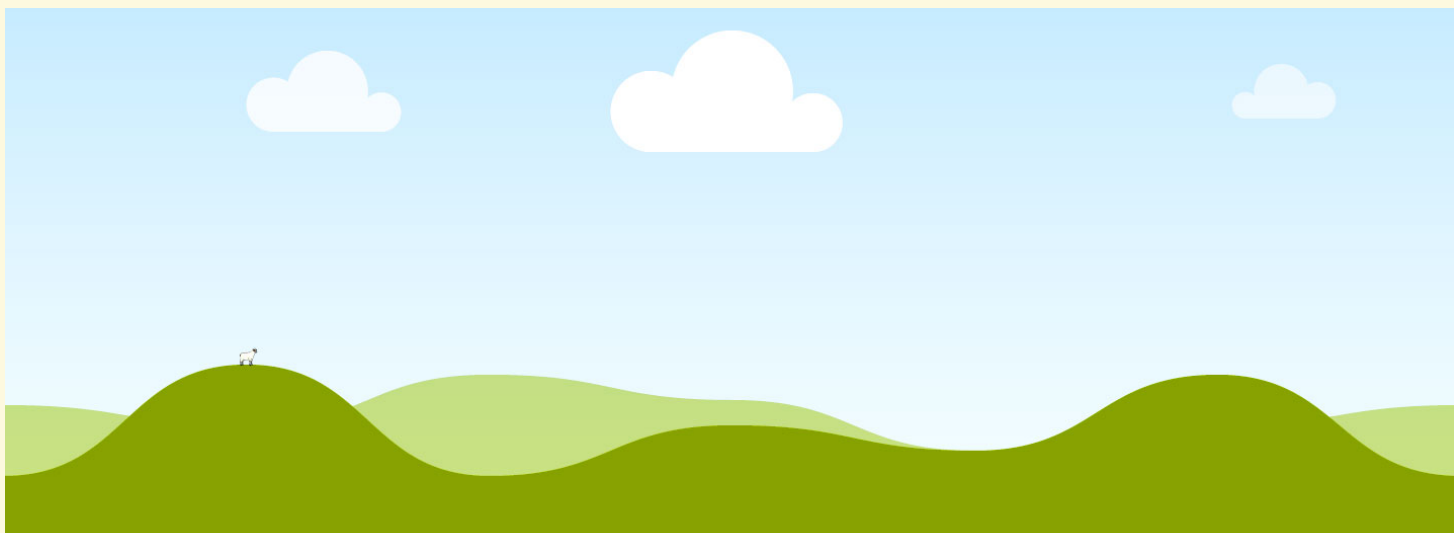
Project Coverage Area



Activities in Detail

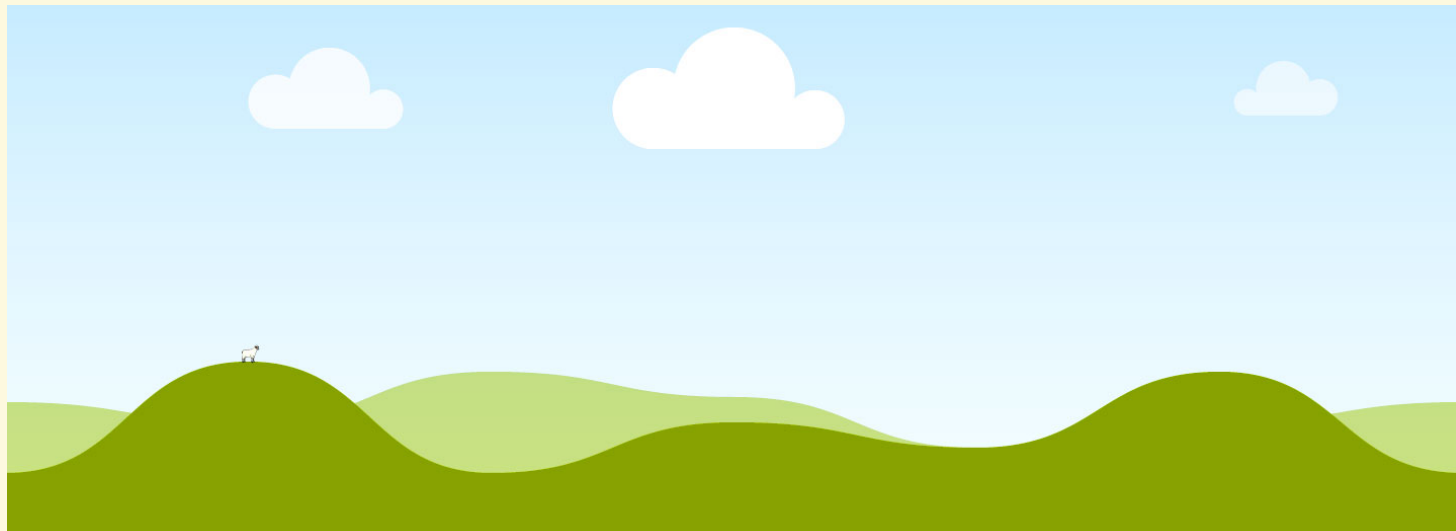
1. Training of Trainers (ToT)

To strengthen the capacity of the project team and local partners, CottonConnect conducted a series of Training of Trainers (ToT) sessions. These sessions were delivered through lectures, group discussions, and presentations, focusing on sustainable agricultural practices and farmer engagement techniques.



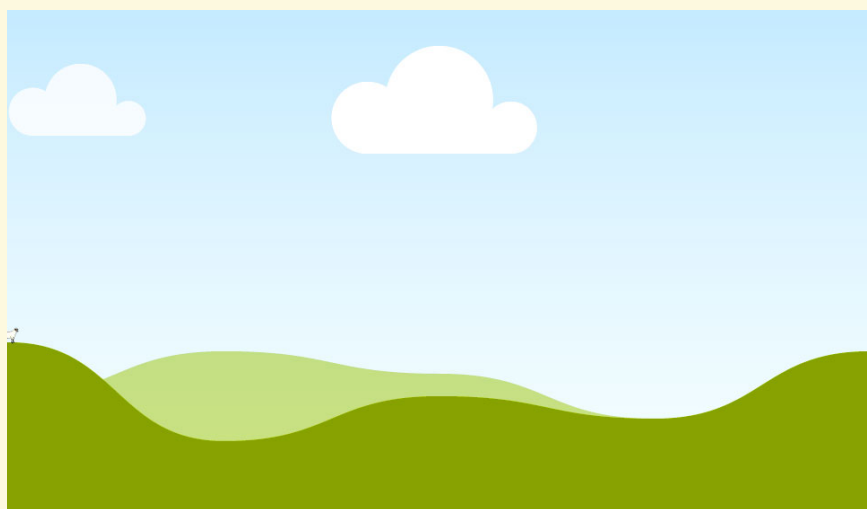
2. Farmers' Training

Comprehensive training sessions were organized for farmers on key topics including pre-sowing activities, Crop Management, Integrated Nutrient Management (INM), Integrated Pest Management (IPM), Integrated Waste Management, safe harvesting practices, contamination-free cotton picking, and the preparation of farmyard manure (FYM) compost.



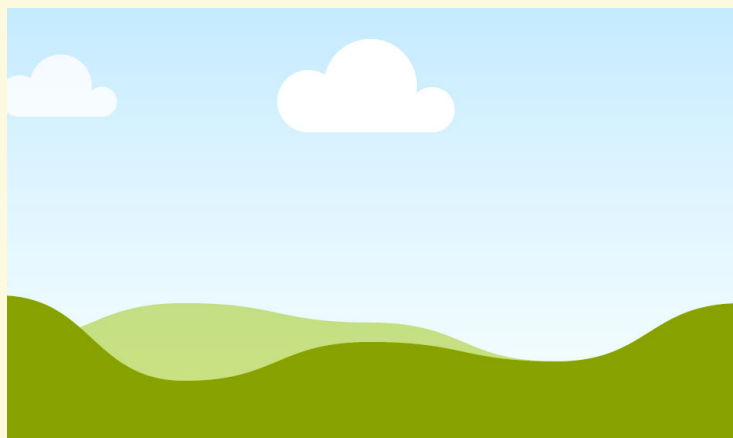
3. Farmers' Group Meetings

Small group meetings were conducted across project villages to provide farmers with practical information on Crop Management techniques. These interactive sessions also served as platforms for farmers to share challenges and receive feasible, field-based solutions from the project team.



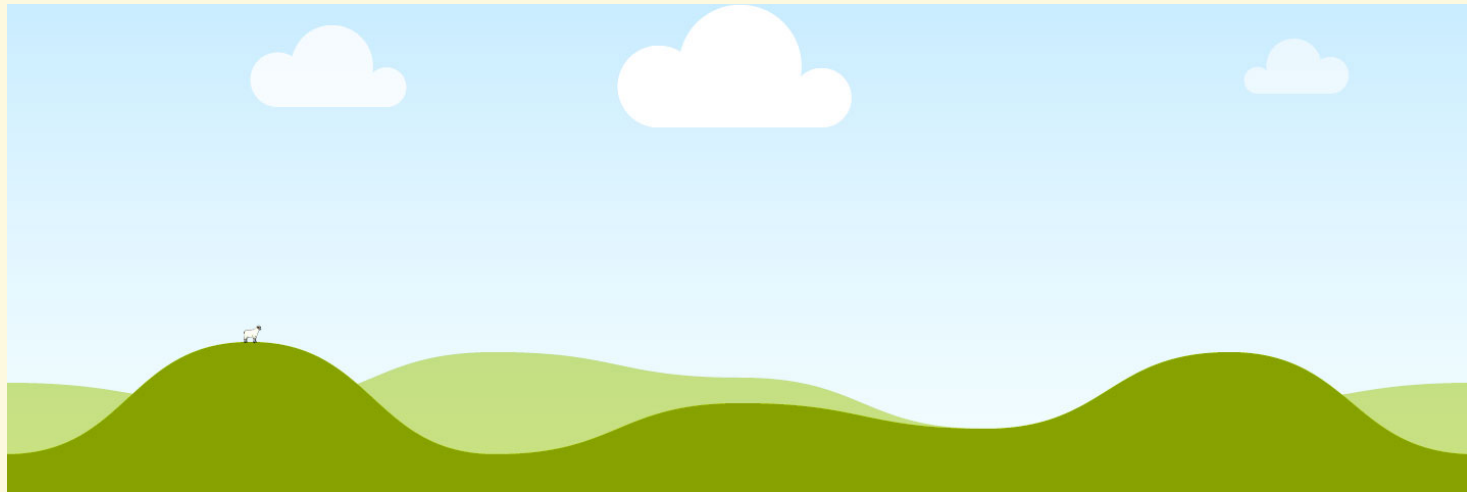
4. Awareness Campaigns

Mobile van campaigns were conducted across project villages to raise awareness among farmers, women, students, and the broader community about sustainable agriculture and safe harvesting practices. These campaigns used audio messages, live lectures, group discussions, and distribution of IEC (Information, Education, and Communication) materials to ensure maximum outreach.



5. Demonstration Plots

Demonstration plots showcasing IPM and INM techniques were established to provide farmers with hands-on learning experiences. Demonstrations enabled farmers to better understand and adopt improved agricultural technologies. Ongoing monitoring and further farmer visits to these plots are planned to enhance learning and adoption.



6. Child Labour Survey & Child-Centered Activities

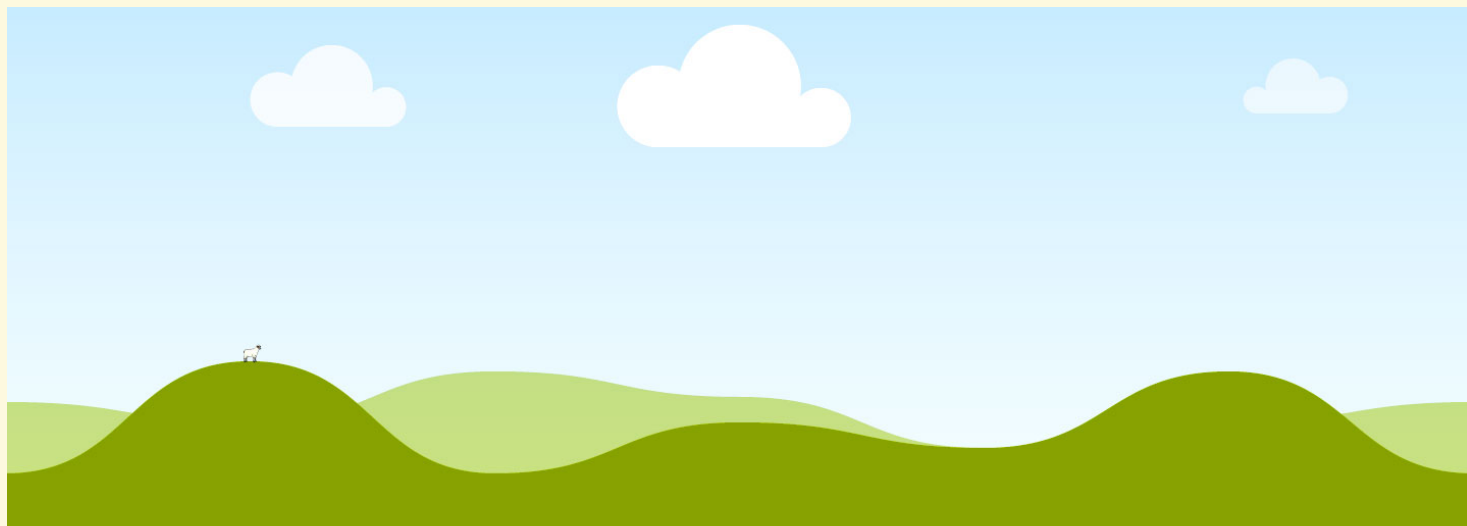
A survey was conducted to assess the presence of child labour in project areas. In parallel, child-centered activities were carried out to promote education, well-being, and awareness among children in farming communities.

7. Drip Irrigation Installation

Drip irrigation systems were installed to promote water-efficient farming. This initiative supports improved water management and helps increase productivity while conserving resources.

8. Bio-Input Centre

A Bio-Input Centre was established to produce and supply eco-friendly inputs such as organic pesticides, compost, and plant tonics. This center plays a crucial role in promoting natural farming practices and reducing dependency on chemical-based agriculture.

Success Story

Cultivating Change with Regenerative Agriculture

Name: Vanrajsinh Jaswantsinh Kothiya

Age: 33

Village: Bujetha, Tilakvada Block, Narmada District

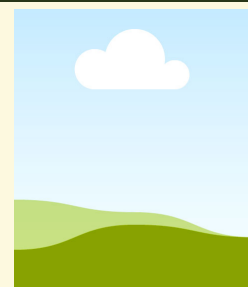
Associated Programme: Mark's (REEL Regenerative Programme) since May 2024

Vanrajsinh Jaswantsinh Kothiya, a 33-year-old farmer from Bujetha village in Narmada district, has been growing cotton on his 20-acre farm since 2015. Like many farmers, he struggled with high input costs, heavy reliance on chemical fertilizers and hazardous pesticides, and lack of trustworthy advice—leading to poor soil health and financial stress.

In May 2024, Vanrajsinh joined the REEL Regenerative Agriculture Programme, which proved to be a turning point. Through hands-on training, exposure visits, and a demonstration plot on his own land, he learned sustainable practices like soil testing, use of pheromone and sticky traps, bird perches, neem oil, bio fertilizers, and homemade bio-pesticides.

These changes not only helped him reduce his input costs by 10–15% but also improved crop health and yield—even during unusually heavy rains and flooding. He also adopted safe harvesting practices and became more aware of social issues like child labour and equal wages. Today, Vanrajsinh is proud of the transformation in his farming approach. He is more confident, financially stable, and deeply committed to eco-friendly agriculture. He actively encourages others in his community to adopt regenerative practices.

“This programme helped me understand the value of soil, environment, and human health. I now use fewer chemicals and get better results. I strongly recommend it to others,” says Vanrajsinh.

When a new member joins a team at that time the organization informs him about the vision and mission of the organization and short instructions about why the organization is being started? The collaboration between organization and Government, what is the voluntary activity, registration of the organization, body, rules, trustees, structure, income expenditure etc. If any members participated in any training/meeting during the month then he did a brief presentation on it in the meeting and if team members found that it is totally new for them then it will be presented among them in detail.
